In 2015, a committed team at Opus launched the first–ever Festival of Debate. Like many others, we felt despair and anger at the inadequate visions for change being offered by politicians and commentators during that year's general election.

We knew the discourse needed to be more plural, more innovative, and less rooted in the status quo. We felt a need to bring people together in Sheffield, to learn from and to be alongside communities, citizens and movements leading change in their streets and their neighbourhoods.

Our focus this year is on systems change. People around the world are starting to recognise that our current trajectory as a planet is self-terminating – that we need to make a radical transition away from dominant systems of neoliberalism, white modernity and colonialism. The net result of these extractive ideologies is that we are effectively at war with future generations of all living things.

We believe places like Sheffield can start demonstrating alternatives to these dominant systems – new ways of thinking that might guide us towards liveable futures for all. We know Sheffielders can do this: we've instigated radical change countless times before.

Across this year's festival, you'll hear many people talking about systemic change and what it might look like. We hope that you will come with an open mind and be respectful of all that you encounter.

In this moment, we're all more connected than we ever have been before and yet we reinforce systems which by design separate us from each other and from the natural ecologies which sustain all life. This is something we can change.


PURPOSE: A WELLBEING ECONOMIES FILM







FOD X GUT LEVEL CLUB NIGHT, FT. PLANTAINCHIPPS & SAVANNA BOYS
















Opus works to create and support responses to achieve urgent systemic change.
